May we continue to walk gently together in reconciliation and peace as we move forward, united in spirit, united in God's love and united as one community to create change for a better Australia.



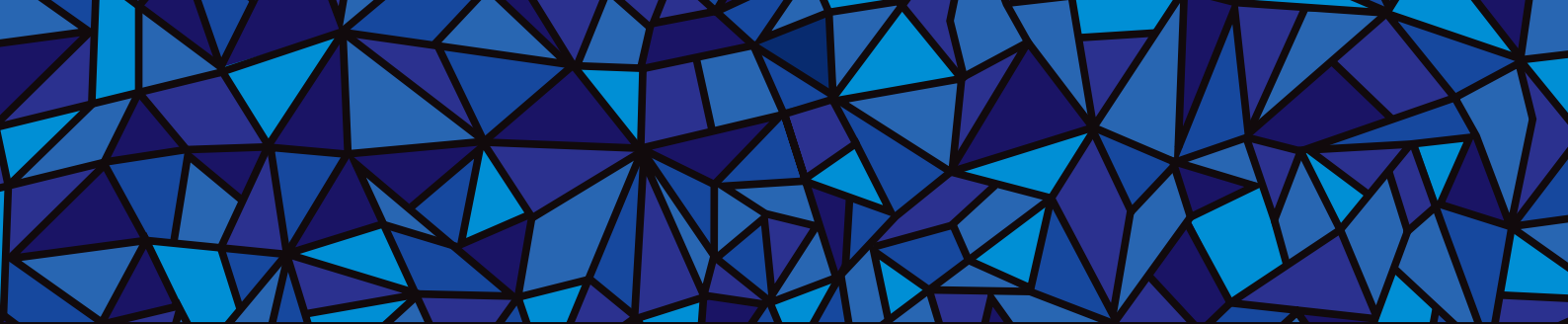
History



The Yuggera people of the Yuggera Language Group were the original inhabitants of this region. Kaggarr Mabul (Mt Gravatt Mountain, adjacent to St Catherine's) was a landmark which guided First Nation peoples from the south, as they journeyed north, to gatherings in the Bunya Mountains. John Oxley recorded sighting this landform during his journey up the Brisbane River in 1824. Farming attracted European settlers to Mt Gravatt and Slacks Creek in the 1860s. After 1931, parts of what is Newnham Road today became part of a stock route from southside farming areas to the Cannon Hill Saleyards. The land beside Newnham Road was eventually developed into small farming blocks. An early celery farmer's home is still a family home in Garie Street. Farms reduced the width of Newnham Road but this route was still used occasionally by travelling stock until the 1960s.

In the 1950s and 1960s following World War II, Mt Gravatt and Upper Mt Gravatt saw the rapid development of housing estates accommodating young families. The developing residential suburb between Logan Road and Bulimba Creek was known as Mt Gravatt South.

In 1952, when as part of St Agnes' Parish (stretching from Mt Gravatt to Kingston), Fr John Rosenskjar was able to use the garage of a plasterer, Mr Moore, on the present site of St Catherine's, as a Mass Centre. For the growing population, St Bernard's School opened in 1955. The first St Catherine's Church was opened in 1960, thanks to extraordinary volunteers, including Jack Tierney. In 1962, St Agnes' School opened. In 1964, Mt Gravatt South State School opened in Morella Street. In 1972, both St Bernard's and St Catherine's were established as distinct Parish

Communities. Fr John O'Shea was St Catherine's first Parish Priest (1969–1970). There was no presbytery so Fr O'Shea lived in Fr Power's house on the present site of Seton College where St Otterin's Church was located. Fr O'Shea's grandmother financed the building of St Catherine's Presbytery, located adjacent to the Staff car park today.

On 4 March, 1973, Archbishop P.M. O'Donnell (in perhaps his last duty before retirement) blessed and opened St Catherine's War Memorial School, founded by the Presentation Sisters in the Nano Nagle tradition. The first principal was Sr Margaret Conway. The initial enrolment consisted of children in Years 1 and 2 situated in one small block of six classrooms. St Catherine's grew quickly and another block of classrooms and an Administration block were built. With the closure of St Munchin's School

in 1979, St Catherine's grew again. St Munchin's had been conducted by the Daughters of Charity on the present multi-dwelling complex called 'Golden Outlook' opposite an entrance to Westfield Carindale on Creek Road. The St Catherine's Year 7 classes had to be accommodated in the Administration block so a third block of classrooms was needed. The School's learning environment was progressive and engaging for all stakeholders.

On 23 June, 1974, Archbishop Rush blessed and opened St Catherine's Presentation Convent. The Presentation Sisters ministered in St Catherine's Primary School, St Thomas More Secondary College and the Catholic Education Office. Presentation Sisters who were Principals of St Catherine's were Sr Margaret Conway 1973–1976, Sr Ricardo 1977–1980 and Sr Denise Ryan 1980–1985.



The Eighties marked some important events for St Catherine's. On 13 February, 1983, Archbishop Rush blessed and opened a new Parish Church built on land acquired by the Parish adjacent to the first Church. The former Church building was refurbished as a Library and Hall. With the help of many families volunteering for working bees, the school's ovals and adventure playground were established.

This decade saw the gradual and then final withdrawal of the Presentation Sisters. The first lay Principal, Mrs Bev Tronc was appointed in 1986, thus beginning a new era for the school. Principals who have succeeded Mrs Tronc have been Mr Michael Byrne 1987-1996, Mrs Annette Duffy 1997-2002, Mrs Helen Camden 2003, Mr John Carroll 2004-2009, Mr Paul Leeson 2010-2019, Mrs Maureen Hunter 2019 and Mr Paul Mitchell since 2020.

With changing demographic patterns, the Nineties saw St Catherine's School contract in size but was no less vital in the community. This technological decade saw computers and digital technology begin to be present throughout the school. This has continued until the present day.

A Preschool was established in 2000. During the trialing of Prep in Queensland schools, a Transition Class was offered here at St Catherine's from 2003-2006 to accommodate children bridging between Kindergarten and Year 1.

On 30 March, 2007, a Creche and Kindergarten Centre was opened on the ground floor of Block B by Peter Fardoulis (Vice President of the C&K Board of Management) and Phil Reeves M.L.A (former student). On 16 May, 2007, the Labouré Library was blessed by Bishop Joseph Oudemann and opened



by Mr David Hutton (Executive Director of Brisbane Catholic Education).

From 2007 to 2014, St Catherine's offered Prep to Year Seven. In 2015, Year Seven became the first year of High School in Queensland, thus making Year Six the Senior class.

The Australian Government's 'Building the Education Revolution Program' enabled the Nano Nagle Centre to be built on the site of the former Convent and opened in 2010. An Outside School Hours Service had begun (before 2009) and had been accommodated in part of what had been the Convent. Incorporated as part of Centacare Child Care Services, now Catholic Early Ed Care, it provides before, after school and vacation care. The OSHC transferred to new facilities in the new Nano Nagle Centre in 2010.

In 2011, St Catherine's Parish Community joined with St Bernard's/St Martin's (Eight Mile Plains) Parish to form the Upper Mt Gravatt Wishart Parish.

In 2012, a new Administration building at St Catherine's was blessed and opened on the site of the earlier Administration building.

St Catherine's is proud of its historical roots and today seeks to provide the riches of a Catholic education for the good of families and children into the future. Throughout five decades, St Catherine's has maintained a commitment to excellence in learning and nurturing each student as a unique individual. The School Covenant, developed in 2004, captured the spirit of St Catherine's according to its history and charism. In 2023, the community has recontextualised the School Covenant (Mission and Vision) to build on the Charism of the Presentation Sisters and it is still a rich benchmark to our hope for the future.

The Story of Nano Nagle



At St Catherine's we have a role model of a life well lived; our Guiding Light – Nano Nagle. She lived her life with the conviction that life is so blessed that it should be lived in service to others; which reflects our school motto "To Love and Serve".

Nano Nagle did not start out serving others. She was born in Ballygriffin in Ireland, County Cork in 1718.

Nano's story is one of a wealthy upbringing, in a privileged family, where she had everything she needed and wanted.

When Nano was young, Catholics in Ireland were banned from education as was overseas travel for Catholic Education. Nano's relatives, with strong connections in France, arranged for Nano and her sister, Ann, to travel to Paris, smuggled in a cargo ship, to attend school. They engaged in their schooling and Nano enjoyed a busy social life in Paris with balls, parties, theatre outings, all the glamour of a wealthy young lady. After one of these parties, she noticed a group of poor and homeless people huddled in a church doorway and was struck by the contrast with her privileged life. This is where her life took a new direction.

When Nano's father died, she returned to Ireland with her eyes open to the extreme poverty of her people. They had no clothes, no jobs, no food, no education and rampant crime amongst the poor. Nano began to visit the sick and the elderly, bringing them food, medicine and comfort. Night and day she visited the impoverished to help those in need with baskets of food, ointments, bandages, money and a lantern. This was dark and treacherous work. Her ministries to the poverty-ridden and sick in her hometown of Cork gave her the nickname 'The Lady of the Lantern'. The lantern later became the symbol of the Presentation Sisters worldwide.

Nano risked her own life and transformed the lives of others by offering hope, love and compassion. Her thirst for justice drove her desire to bring about change for a better world. Her biggest fight was the injustice of a system that did not allow education for Catholic children. Nano acknowledged that sometimes in life we fight battles that seem overwhelming, perhaps even impossible, but she refused to give up despite the risk and hardship. Everything she planned to do was illegal and would put not only herself but also her family at risk; the risk of imprisonment and the risk of death by hanging. She would not let her work, God's work, be stifled because of fear.

Nano said, "If I try and succeed, I will know that it is God's will. So I am going to try. I will leave the rest in His hands".





Nano established her first school for the poor in 1754, in a rented mud cabin in Cove Lane. This was done in defiance of the law and in complete secrecy for fear of persecution. Within nine months she had 200 girls attending her secret schools. In three years, she had eight schools operating, five for girls and three for boys.

Nano decided to open a convent where women could share the mission of Jesus through prayer, teaching and care for the sick and needy. Nano and three companions opened the first Presentation Convent in Cork, Ireland, on Christmas Day in 1775. Nano founded the Sisters of the Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary (PBVM), commonly known as the Presentation Sisters, now a worldwide Catholic Institute of religious women. She was declared Venerable in the Roman Catholic Church on 31

October, 2013 by Pope Francis, on the path toward possible canonization as a Saint.

Service to others requires that we stop thinking about ourselves and instead focus on the people around us, or as Nano Nagle would say, "Deeds, not Words". Her deeds now mean that hundreds of schools in twenty-four countries across the globe are founded by the light of Nano and the Presentation Sisters.

Nano Nagle died on 26 April, 1784. Her last words to the small group of sisters at her bedside were, "Love one another as you have hitherto done." Her last words have helped to form our most important school rule at St Catherine's, 'Treat Others with Respect', which is based on the Golden Rule, 'Treat others the way you would like them to treat you'.

Charism of the Presentation Sisters

Charisms, or spiritual gifts, are special abilities given to all Christians by the Holy Spirit to give them power to represent Christ and to be a channel of God's goodness in the world. A charism is a deep awareness of Gospel values linked to a special need in the world. It is expressed variously in different times, places and cultures – including in our own time and wherever we are. It calls forth from us radical responses to address real needs. Nano Nagle's dream was for all to be able to participate fully in life. The denial of education for the poor and for Catholic children in Ireland in the 18th Century was unjust and denied them, individually and as a society, freedom and a future. The aristocrat Nano risked political, military and social repercussions to initiate radical social changes so that this could happen. She devoted herself and her wealth to the education of the poor and destitute. In the unlit alleyways of Cork, by the light of a dim lantern,

Nano took risks visiting homeless and sick women in their humble homes, bringing them compassion and practical help.

Being a school founded by the Presentation Sisters, we have adopted the Presentation charism which is a gift spread through the Holy Spirit in the Church and in the world. Nano Nagle engaged in God's mission (her charism) which was characterised by:

- Passion for those made poor and for changing the structures of society that made and kept people poor
- Zeal – doing "all in her power" to change the way things were for those made poor
- Courage
- Trust in Divine Providence

All are found in our School Covenant.



Living Faith – Live like Jesus and Nano Nagle

As you move through life, take time to live just as Nano and Jesus did. Find opportunities big and small, every day, to show compassion to the sick, the poor and the marginalised. Don't ever forget that your uniqueness – your gift that you bring to the world – is a blessing for those around you. Embrace the potential you have to make a difference to one, a few, or many.

The St Catherine's community promotes Living Faith through the values of the Presentation Sisters by:

- Nurturing a spirituality which is embedded in a relationship with Jesus Christ and the human concerns of our world
- Providing opportunities for prayer and for meaningful participation in liturgy
- Providing an environment in which faith is nurtured and in which priority is given to the Religious Education curriculum

The Presentation Sisters have been the guardians of Nano Nagle's dream to engage in the Mission of God. Their hopes, dreams, passion and stories live on in us at St Catherine's and in all the people around the world who have been inspired or touched by the Presentation charism.

The way Nano Nagle engaged in God's mission (her charism) was characterised by her passion for

the poor, fighting injustice, doing "all in her power", courage and trust in Divine Providence.

We continue to live this charism through "Justice with Compassion" (Nano Nagle) which is reflected in our school's motto "To Love and Serve" (To Love – compassion and Serve – Justice).

- Timers on Hot Water / ZIP heater Systems to save electricity

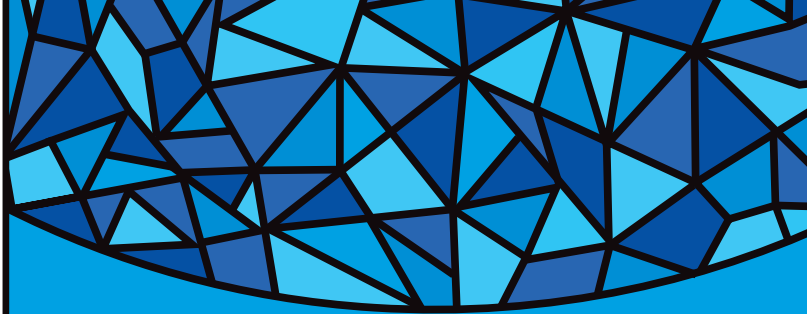

The St Catherine's community promotes the Power of Hope through the values of the Presentation Sisters by:

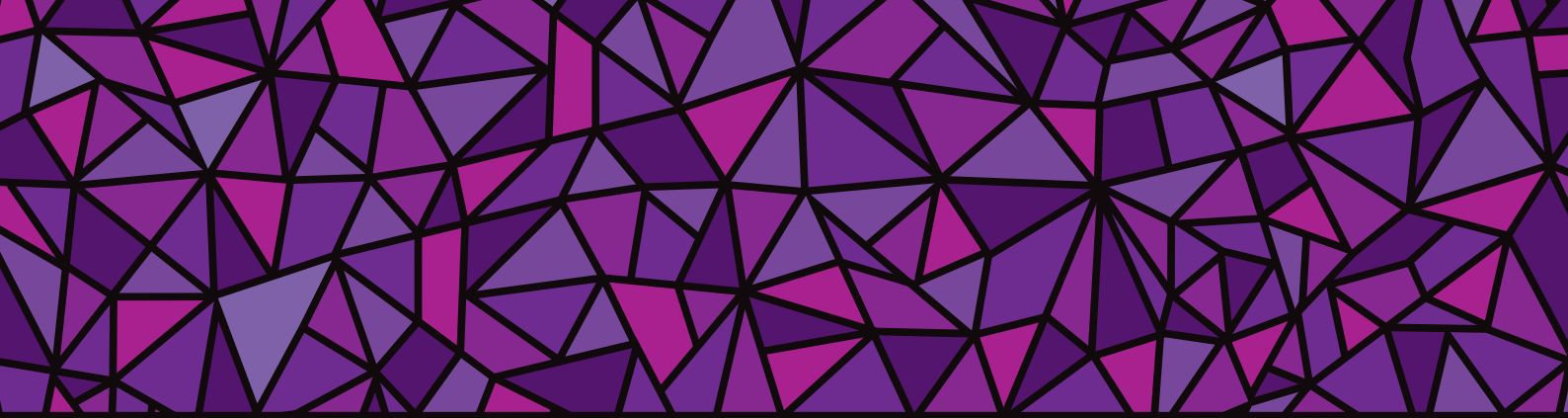
- Empowering students to live the Word of God to create change for a better world, as disciples of Jesus, in a spirit of gentleness and simplicity

Icon of Nano Nagle

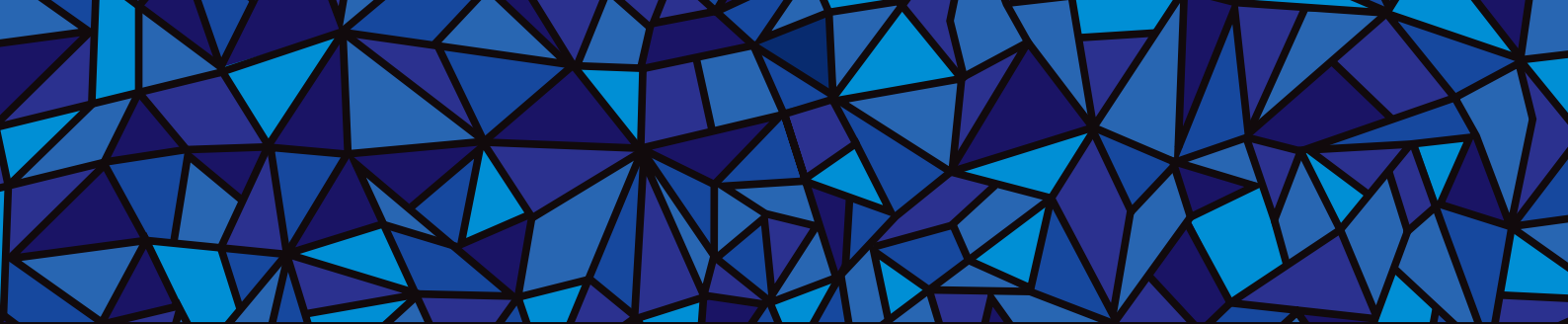


The icon must be viewed not only with the physical eye but also with the eye of the Spirit. The icon follows Nano's story as it unfolds and explores through symbols the joy and pain, energy and stillness, success and failure, agony and ecstasy, all of which were present in her life.

St Catherine's is proud to have beautiful mosaics around the school that bring the great love and service of Nano Nagle's story to life. At the entrance to our school community members and visitors pass by a beautiful image of Nano Nagle, 'Lady of the Lantern'. The Covenant Court rainbow mosaic reminds us of God's promise to Noah, a Covenant to be by our side in times of struggle. We must always have hope that our challenges will pass. A rainbow is also a sign of hope and for the future. The rainbow mosaic also has a Celtic Cross to remind us of Nano Nagle's Irish heritage. Our Nano Nagle Centre (Hall/OSHC/Sport/Music complex) is named in her honour. Inside, the Icon of Nano Nagle hangs complementing the banners of our House Patrons.

In 2016, the 'Concrete Oval' in front of the Nano Nagle Centre where children play each day was renamed 'Cove Lane' after the first school Nano courageously founded in Cork, Ireland. A beautiful mosaic depicts Nano taking the first children to her first school. Lantern Way, the area in and around the Tuckshop, is named in honour of Nano Nagle, the Lady of the Lantern. In the Prep learning area, a special 50 Years of St Catherine's mosaic highlights Nano's love of education with her famous quote, 'Today is a Great Day to Learn Something New'. We hope all children take this positive disposition towards learning with them throughout their time at our school and into their future lives.

Patron Saint – St Catherine Labouré



St Catherine Labouré, D.C.. (2 May 2 1806 – 31 December, 1876) was a French nun who was a member of the Daughters of Charity of Saint Vincent de Paul. She noticed the plight of the poor and decided to enter the nursing order of the Daughters of Charity to care for them. She spent forty years caring for the poor, elderly and sick, in a hospice just outside Paris. St Catherine also worked on the hospice farm, caring for the animals with kindness and humility. In honour of the Blessed Virgin Mary, she created the Miraculous Medal of Our Lady of Graces worn by millions of people around the world. St Catherine is known as a patron saint of the elderly. St Catherine had a special devotion to Mary, Mother of God and was a woman of compassion, charity and devotion.

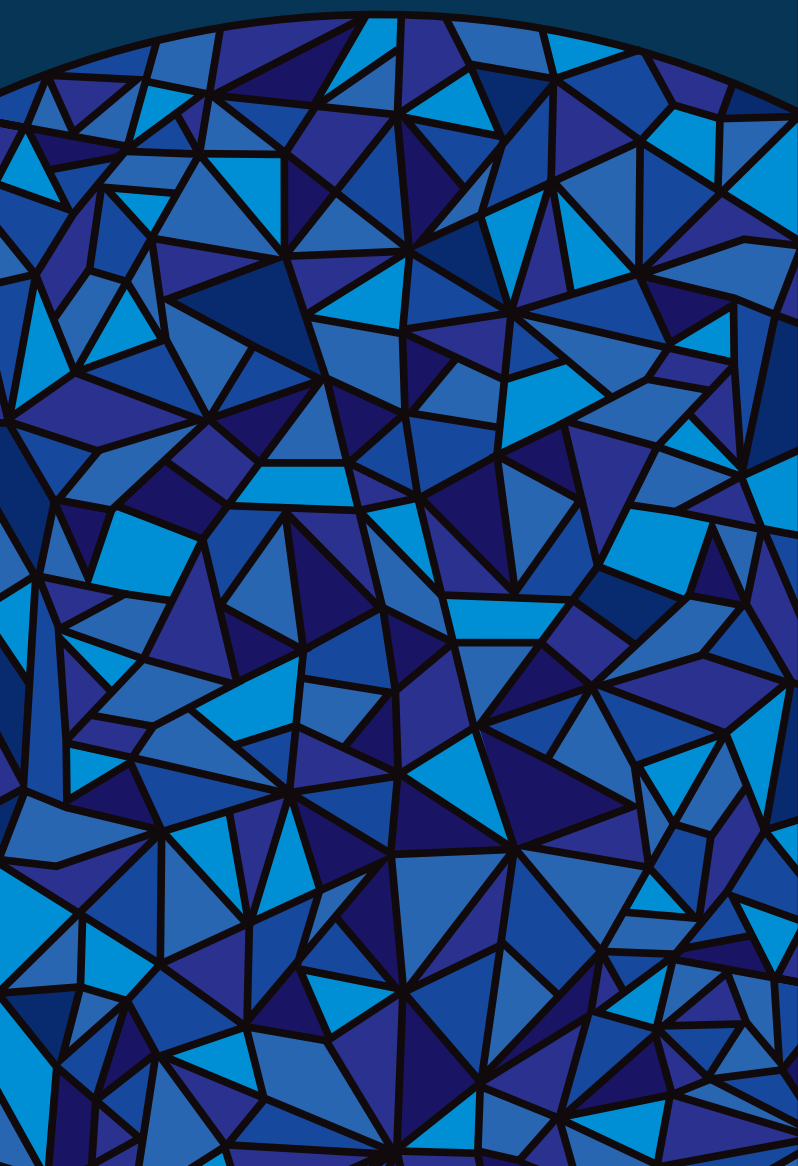

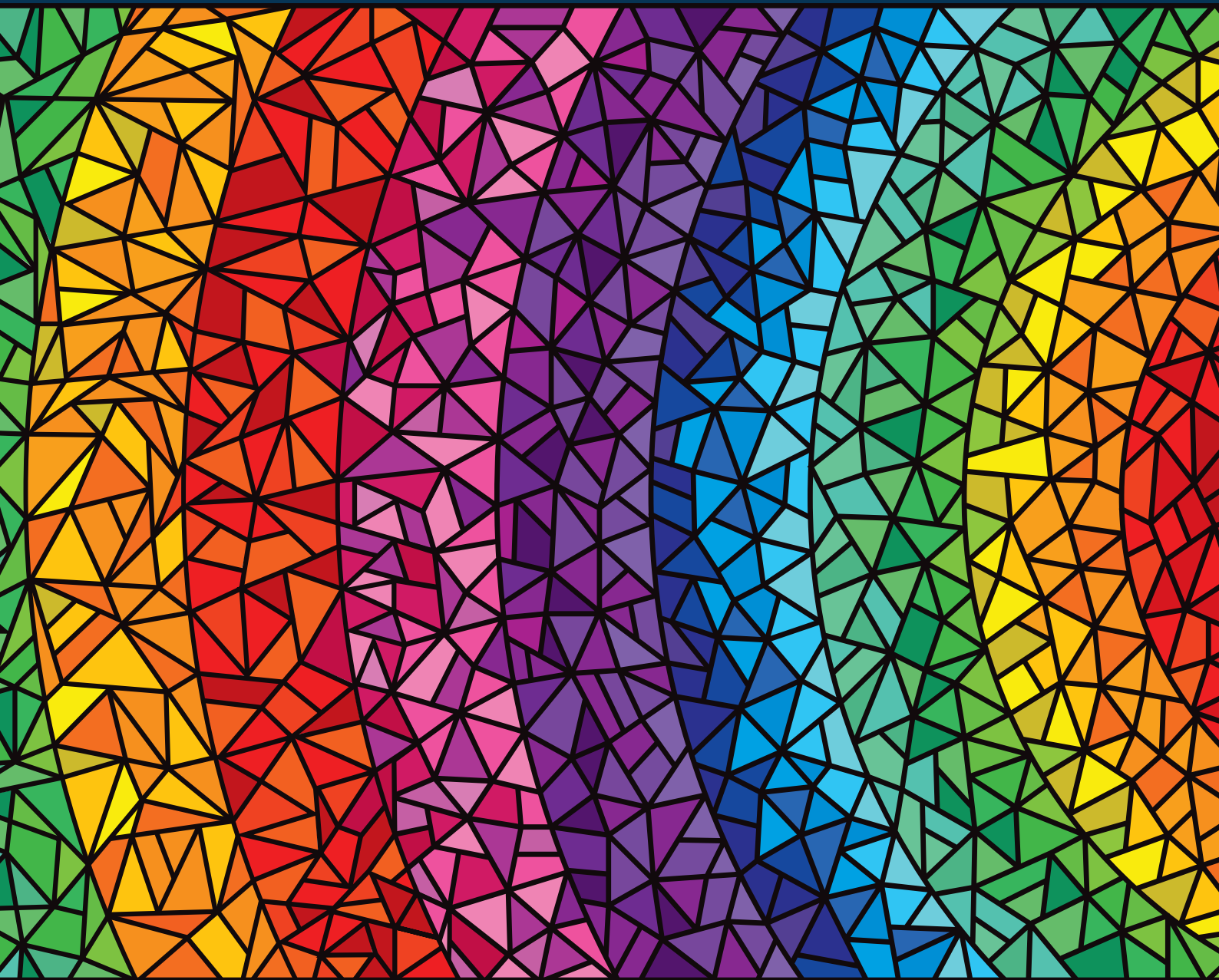
